History and Current Situation

In 1976, a remarkable group of committed B'nai B'rith International members purchased a 380-acre property on Lake Beulah in Southern Wisconsin. The site had previously been a private summer camp called Burr Oaks, but it soon became the new home of B'nai B'rith Beber Camp. Over the years, we have grown and flourished to the current state of capacity. We are home to a world-class retreat center and are currently incorporated as an independent 501 (c)(3) non-profit entity. Throughout the past four decades, Beber Camp has positively impacted almost 15,000 campers and staff.

Beber Camp is committed to building a community based on the core values of safety, inclusivity, fun, and Jewish values. Beber Camp leverages its amazing assets of our staff, our lay leadership, our site, and our best-in-class approach to Jewish camping to achieve our goals summer after summer.
